All of us are grappling with the violent deaths of Georgia resident Ahmaud Arbery, Minneapolis citizen George Floyd, Kentucky citizen Breonna Taylor, and too many other instances of racism and violence against people of color. These senseless acts strike at the heart of Emory's commitment to upholding equity, diversity, and inclusion.

As you know, Georgia is among a handful of states that do not have a hate crimes law. It is time to stand together against intolerance and racism and pass legislation that addresses these critical issues. The Emory community stands for justice in all aspects of our mission, and when confronted with hatred and prejudice, we must speak out.

Emory is firmly committed to a better Georgia. As the General Assembly reconvenes to complete the 2020 Legislative Session, we write to urge you to support, approve, and sign into law a comprehensive bill against hate crimes. While we advocate for the passage of hate crimes legislation, we also understand that this, alone, is not enough. We will continue to encourage government leaders and our communities to engage in sincere dialogue about race and equality and stand united against violence and discrimination.

As we seek a more just and equitable Georgia for all, Emory stands ready to provide any assistance or support you may need to pass hate crimes legislation this year.
